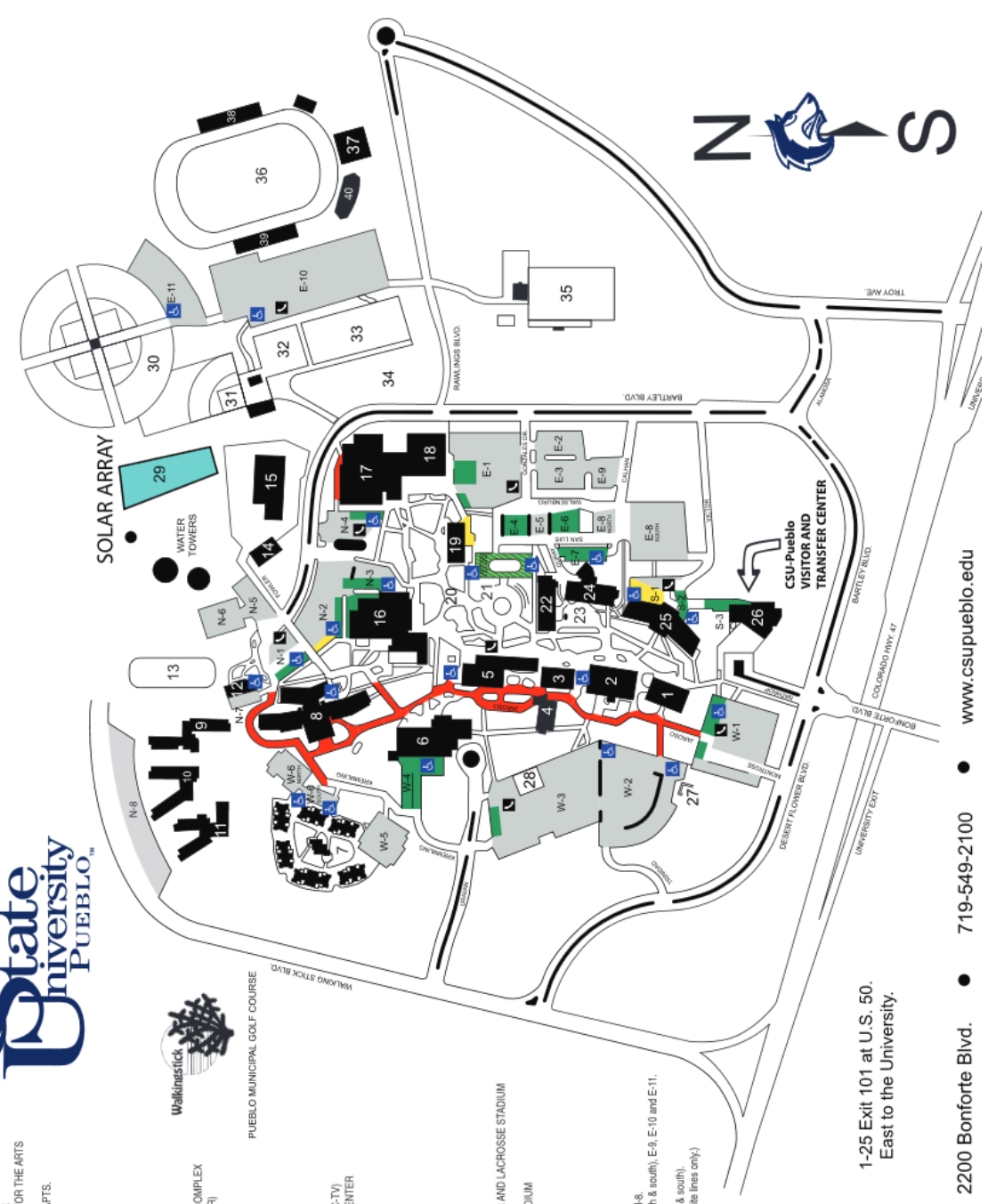

CITY CAUCUS

RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES

1. A citizen may only appear on the City and County General Election ballot once, unless they are nominee for State Senate, and may only hold one full time position. Election Commission, City Party Chairman and Secretary, County Party Chairman and Secretary, and House and Senate Calendar Committeemen are positions that are elected during the City or County Party Caucuses. These positions will not appear on the ballot and are not full time positions.
2. Election Commissioners may only serve as the Election Commissioner until City/County and State/Legislative branches are open for business. He will not appear on any ballot as these positions are elected during the initial phase of the City Party Caucus. The Election Commissioner will be appointed to a City or County position after the election, and will serve in the State House of Representatives. If an Election Commissioner would like to be nominated for a state-level office or US Senator, he must resign his Election Commissioner role. A replacement shall be appointed by the Mayor. Additional opportunities exist at the state level under the Secretary of State.
3. If a State Senator is elected to an office at the state level (State Party Chairman, Governor, LT Governor, State Treasurer, or Secretary of State), he must resign his Senatorial seat. To fill the vacancy, the City's Mayor will appoint a citizen, who must be confirmed by the City Council.
4. All citizens will be elected or appointed to a City or County Government office.
5. All citizens must be registered to vote in any election. BSF-10

PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A CITY CAUCUS

The City will meet in their predesignated City meeting locations for a quick overview of the nomination process, how to become a candidate, offices to be nominated, and the election of the City Election Commissioner (done by the City Counselor). **The Election Commissioner may participate in all nominating actives, but cannot be nominated or appear on the City General Election ballot.**

After the election of the Election Commissioner, the City will split along party lines, and convene for their respective City Party Caucus in their assigned areas. A Counselor or Senior Advisor will serve as the temporary City Party Chairman and assist in the organization of the caucus, and he will serve in this capacity until a City Party Chairman is elected.

After outlining the caucus rules, procedures, and positions to be nominated and elected, the Counselor will open up nominations for City Party Chairman. Once a City Party Chairman is elected, he will take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the City Party Caucus, and lead the nomination and election process for the City Party Secretary. Once the Party Secretary is elected, the City Party Chairman will open up nominations for the rest of the elected City positions in the following order: Mayor (1), City Council (5), City Treasurer & Auditor (1), Police & Fire Chief (1), and Director of Parks & Recreation (1). Once all City positions are nominated, he will then open nominations for the 6 State Senate seats. State Senate seats are open to everyone, even if they have been nominated for a City

office or wish to be nominated for a County office. The Election Commissioner may not run for State Senate.

NOTE: City Party Chairman and City Party Secretary are temporary positions. Citizens elected to these positions are eligible to run for any office within Colorado Boys State.

At the conclusion of the City Party Caucus, the City Party Secretary is responsible for the completion of BSF-1A (City Party Caucus Nominees), and this is to be turned into the Election Commissioner no later than 8:15 PM, Sunday.

All City Party Caucus should be completed within an hour and thirty minutes. BSF-1A must be completed by the City Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner. All Election Commissioners must report to the Election Commission Headquarters no later than 8:30 PM Sunday with their completed BSF-1A.

CAMPAIGNING

No citizen may use pre-made campaign materials from home, and engaging in negative campaigning is discouraged. No materials should be hung on windows, exit signs, fire equipment, light fixtures, or bathrooms. Use your best judgment.

COUNTY CAUCUS

RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES

1. A citizen may only appear on the City and County General Election ballot once, unless they are nominee for State Senate, and may only hold one full time position. Election Commission, City Party Chairman and Secretary, County Party Chairman and Secretary, and House and Senate Calendar Committeemen are not full time positions.
2. All citizens will be elected or appointed to a City or County Government office.
3. All citizens must be registered to vote in any election. BSF-10

PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A COUNTY CAUCUS

The County will meet in their predesignated County Party Caucus meeting locations for a quick overview of the nomination process, how to become a candidate, offices to be nominated, and committee elections. **The Election Commissioner will not participate in all nominating actives, and cannot be nominated or appear on the ballot as he will be in the initial Election Commission Meeting.**

A Counselor or Senior Advisor will serve as the temporary County Party Chairman and assist in the organization of the caucus. He will serve in this capacity until a County Party Chairman is elected.

After outlining the caucus rules, procedures, and positions to be nominated and elected, the Counselor will open up nominations for County Party Chairman. Once a County Party Chairman is elected, he will

take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the County Party Caucus, and lead the nomination and election process for the County Party Secretary. Once the Party Secretary is elected, the County Party Chairman will open up nominations for the rest of the elected County positions in the following order: County Commissioners (3-at large), Assessor & Surveyor (1), Clerk & Recorder (1), Coroner (1), Sheriff (1), and Treasurer (1). Once all County positions are nominated, he will begin the election process for, Senate Calendar Committee (1), and House Calendar Committee (1).

NOTE: County Party Chairman and County Party Secretary are temporary positions. Citizens elected to these positions are eligible to run for any office within Colorado Boys State.

NOTE: Only State Senate Nominees are eligible to be elected to the Senate Calendar Committee. If he fails to gain a seat in the General Election, the County Commissioners are required to appoint a replacement to the committee from the same party. Conversely, a State Senate nominee cannot be elected to the House Calendar Committee.

At the conclusion of the County Party Caucus, the County Party Secretary is responsible for the completion of BSF-1B (County Party Caucus Nominees), and this is to be turned into the Election Commission President no later than 9:45 PM, Sunday.

All County Party Caucus should be completed within an hour and twenty minutes. BSF-1B must be completed by the County Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner President.

STATE PARTY CONVENTION

PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A STATE CONVENTION

The State Party Convention elects a State Party Chairman, Secretary, and Parliamentarian. The state party officials preside over the convention as it nominates candidates for state offices.

The State Party Convention is called to order by a Counselor and an Election Commission Representative, who will remain the presiding officers until a State Party Chairman is elected. To kick off the convention, the presiding officer will introduce the rules and procedures to entire party caucus. These rules are then voted upon and will remain in effect for the remainder of the State Party Convention. Please note: these rules and procedures may be amended.

After establishing the convention rules and procedures, nominations for State Party Chairman will be opened. Once a State Party Chairman is elected, he will take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the State Party Convention; leading with the nomination and election process for the State Party Secretary and State Party Parliamentarian.

Please Note: to become an eligible candidate for State Party Chairman or State Party Parliamentarian, you must pass the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. A list of eligible citizens will be provided to the Election Commission Representative leading the State Party Convention from the Election Commission.

Once the party leadership is in place, the State Party Chairman will open up nominations for the State elected positions in the following order: Governor (2), Lieutenant Governor (2), United States Senator (4), Secretary of State (2), Attorney General (2), and State Treasurer (2). Once all State positions are nominated, the remaining time should be used for campaigning and strategizing for the State Party Primary Election. The candidate who receives a majority of the votes in the State Party Primary (except for US Senator-top two vote getters) will move on to the General Election.

Please Note: to become an eligible candidate for Attorney General, you must pass the Bar Exam. A list of eligible citizens will be provided by the Election Commission to the State Party Secretary.

Please Note: before accepting the nomination for a State Government position (Governor, Lieutenant Governor, United States Senator, Secretary of State, Attorney General, and State Treasurer) a petition (BSF-6) must be completed and turned into the State Party Secretary, then immediately initially reviewed by the Election Commission President.

Once the State Party Convention is completed, the BSF-1C must be finalized by the State Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner President along with all completed petitions.

RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES FOR STATE OFFICIALS AND PARTY LEADERSHIP

1. A citizen may only appear once on the State Primary and General Election ballot.
 - a. All citizens elected or appointed to a City or County Government Office are eligible for all State elections.
2. All citizens are eligible to appear on the State Level ballot:
 - a. Election Commissioner: Must resign as an Election Commissioner prior to the opening of the State Party Convention if a Commissioner will want to run for a State Party Office or be nominated for a State Level Office.
 - b. State Party Leadership (Chairman, Secretary, and Parliamentarian): Once elected to a State Party Leadership position, he can resign but cannot be nominated for a State Level Office.
 - i. Election of a new State Party Chairman: Led by the Election Commission Representative. Anyone can be nominated and they must have passed the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. The election of the State Party Chairman should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
 - ii. Election of a new State Party Secretary: Led by the State Party Chairman. Anyone can be nominated (unless they already hold a State Party leadership position). The election of the State Party Secretary should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
 - iii. Election of a new State Party Parliamentarian: Led by the State Party Chairman. Anyone can be nominated (unless they already hold a State Party leadership position) and they must have passed the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. The election of the State Party Parliamentarian should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
3. Once a citizen receives a nomination and is chosen to appear on the State Party Primary Ballot, he may not resign or run for another office.
4. Election Commissioners Representative Role
 - a. Service as the presiding officer until the State Party Chairman is elected.
 - i. If the Chairman were to resign, he would serve in this regard until a new chair is elected.
 - b. Special Assistant to the State Party Secretary:
 - i. Immediate review all petitions as they are collected. Petitions must be review for completeness prior to the first “narrowing down” vote.
 - ii. Provide a list of those citizens who have passed the Bar and Parliamentary Procedure Exams.
 - iii. Support all needs of the State Party Secretary in developing polleverywhere.com votes.
5. Requirements for Nomination:
 - a. State Party Chairman – Pass Parliamentary Procedure Exam
 - b. State Party Secretary – None
 - c. State Party Parliamentarian – Pass Parliamentary Exam
 - d. Governor – Completed Petition

- e. Lieutenant Governor – Completed Petition
 - f. US Senator – Completed Petition
 - g. Secretary of State – Completed Petition
 - h. State Treasurer – Completed Petition
 - i. Attorney – Completed Petition and Pass Bar Exam
6. Petition (BSF-6) requirements for acceptance
- a. It must bear the non-duplicated signatures of 20 Colorado Boys State citizens other than the candidate.
 - b. Surrendered to the State Party Secretary upon nomination
 - c. Petitions are immediately initially reviewed by the State Party Secretary and Election Commission Representative. Once elected the Secretary of State will affirm.
 - d. All petitions must be surrendered to the State Party Secretary and initially reviewed by an Election Commission Representative prior to the close of the call for nominations.

THE RULES GOVERNING STATE PARTY CONVENTIONS

1. Delegates will be seated according to City in the same section as their County.
2. Cities will be polled alphabetically in nomination and voting.
3. During the roll call for nominations, the City when called, nominates its candidate(s).
 - a. Individuals cannot self-nominate, and every nomination must be seconded by some other than the nominator and nominee.
 - b. There are not to be any nomination speeches at this time.
 - c. Petition must be turn in at this time.
4. Once all Cities have been polled, a final call for nominations will be taken. Once all nominations have been made, nominations will be closed.
5. Rules for Party Leadership:
 - a. If more than 8 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 8 candidates and top 8 move forward.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 8 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - iv. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 move forward.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - v. Remaining 4 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.

- vi. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - vii. Remaining 2 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once both candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - viii. Vote for one candidate, and the winner assumes the State Party Office.
 - 1. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip moderated by the election commission representative.
- b. If 5 to 8 nominees:
- i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 4 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - iv. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - v. Remaining 2 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once both candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - vi. Vote for one candidate, and the winner assumes the State Party Office.
 - 1. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip moderated by the election commission representative.
- c. If 3 or 4 nominees:
- i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 2 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once both candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - iv. Vote for one candidate, and the winner assumes the State Party Office.
 - 1. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip moderated by the election commission representative.

- d. If 2 nominees:
 - i. Each candidate is permitted up to 2 minutes to speak in the order of nomination. Once both candidates have used their speaking time, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - ii. Vote for one candidate, and the winner assumes the State Party Office.
 - 1. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip moderated by the election commission representative.
 - e. If 1 nominee:
 - i. Assumes the State Party Office..
6. Rules for State Level Offices:
- a. If more than 8 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 8 candidates and top 8 move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 8 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - iv. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - v. Remaining 4 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - vi. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - b. If 5 to 8 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 30 seconds in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 30 seconds, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 move forward.
 - 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 4 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - iv. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.

1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
- c. If 3 or 4 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 2 candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
- d. If 2 nominees:
 - i. Both candidates move forward to State Party Primary Election.
- e. If 1 nominee:
 - i. Appears unopposed on State Party Primary Election ballot.
7. Rules for US Senate:
 - a. If more than 8 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 1 minute in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 1 minute, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boys State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 8 candidates and top 8 move forward.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - iii. Remaining 8 candidates are permitted to speak for up to 2 minutes in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 2 minutes, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - iv. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - b. If 5 to 8 nominees:
 - i. All candidates are permitted to speak for up to 2 minutes in the order of nomination. Once all candidates have used their 2 minutes, each will be given the opportunity to state their name and Boy State City.
 - ii. Vote for up to 4 candidates and top 4 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election.
 1. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - c. If 3 or 4 nominees:
 - i. All candidates move forward to State Party Primary Election.
 - d. If 2 nominees:
 - i. Candidates appear unopposed on State Party Primary Election ballot.
8. The Parliamentarian serves as timer. He shall set an audio timer for each speech.

9. All voting is to be done by using polleverywhere.com set up by the State Party Secretary (Name on Name Tag – Boys State City) with help from the Election Commission. If electronic voting is not available, then the raising of hands is the preferred method.
10. Results of all voting should not be shared with the candidates.
11. Where the caucus rules do not take care of a situation, Roberts Rules of Order prevail.

*Selection of party candidates for the State Party Leadership and Primary Ballot are subject to the established rules. These rules are voted upon by the entire party and are subject to change by the party prior to selecting primary election candidates.

THE OPERATIONAL PROCEDURE FOR STATE PARTY CONVENTIONS

1. An Election Commission Representative serves as the presiding officer until the State Party Chairman is elected.
 - a. The Election Commission Representative opens the caucus by presenting the State Party Convention Rules and Procedures
 - b. Conduct the Election of the State Party Chairman
2. Once the State Party Chairman is elected, he shall conduct the following:
 - a. Election of the rest of the State Party Leadership:
 - i. State Party Secretary
 - ii. State Party Parliamentarian
 - b. Nomination of the State Offices:
 - i. Governor
 - ii. Lieutenant Governor
 - iii. US Senators
 - iv. Secretary of State
 - v. State Treasurer
 - vi. Attorney General
3. Close State Party Caucus no later than Noon. If there is any remaining time, the State Party Chairman shall instruct the citizens to develop election strategies and to camping.

PROCEDURES FOLLOWED IN PASSING BILLS IN THE STATE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

1. Calendar Committee Review

- a. The Committee Chairman brings the bills to his committee meeting for discussion
- b. All bills are reviewed by the committee and grouped by content to help determine which bills will move forward
 - i. All bills are to be considered and grouped by content and organized into a main bill to be present to the respective legislator.
- c. Establishes the Order of Business (BSF-7) for the first reading
- d. Bills are forwarded from the Calendar Committee:
 - i. Senate Clerk
 - ii. House Clerk
- e. Provide a list of recommended committees to their respective chambers leadership. Said committees are:
 - i. Finance and Appropriations (Taxation and Expenditure)
 - ii. Transportation
 - iii. Education
 - iv. Judiciary
 - v. Healthy and Human Services
 - vi. Local Governments
 - vii. Business, Labor, Technology

- f. The above mentioned committees may be modified, created or eliminated upon a 2/3 vote of the Calendar Committee
 - g. No more than 11 committees may exist in the House and 8 in the Senate
2. **Introduction**
 - a. All bills and resolutions must be introduced by a member of the legislature. Senators introduce their bills in the Senate and Representatives introduce their bills in the House.
 - b. The bill itself must bear the name of a member or the names of a group of members of the legislature.
 - c. All bills must be turned into the Senate or House Calendar Committee for ordering, approval, and forwarding to the Senate or House Secretary for first reading.
 - d. All revenue bills must originate in the House.
 3. **First reading by the clerk**
 - a. All bills are numbered consecutively
 - b. Introduced by the Secretary of the chamber by its number and title (example: Senate Bill 06 – The Integration of Boys and Girls State)
 - c. To be read by the Clerk (with the help of the author if possible)
 - d. Bill is read, there is no debate at this time
 4. **Bills and Members assigned to committees by Speaker of the House/President of the Senate**
 - a. Each Calendar Committee will pre-establish committees based off of the bills they have reviewed, and provide recommended committee assignments for each bill
 - b. The Speaker/President shall assign each bill to a specific committee for consideration.
 - c. Each member of the House and Senate will serve on only one committee.
 - d. Every member of the state legislature shall serve on one committee.
 - e. The Speaker of the House and President of the Senate will appoint members of their respective chambers to each committee
 - i. House – no more than 11 members and a minimum of 7 on a committee and no more than 3 can be from the same city
 - ii. Senate – no more than 6 members and a minimum of 4 on a committee and no more than 2 can be from the same city
 - iii. Leadership may ask for volunteers, but they hold the ultimate decision on committee assignments
 - iv. The Speaker of the House and President of the Senate will assign the Chairman and Vice Chairman for each committee
 5. **Committee Hearing (where public testimony & amendments may be offered) in consideration of the bill**
 - a. Earliest stage of bill review and the workhorse of the legislator
 - b. Review assigned bills
 - i. Receive testimony from public, including the governor’s staff, on the bill
 - ii. Amend and mark-up bill as needed
 - c. After public testimony, debate on each bill shall be limited to 8 minutes.
 - d. Vote on the bill for either a favorable report to the full chamber, an unfavorable report, or postpone indefinitely, effectively killing the bill. All bills with a vote (favorable or unfavorable) shall be given to the Calendar Committee to be placed on the docket
 6. **Committee reports offered**
 - a. Provide a brief report of the bill, favorable or unfavorable, and provide a minority report for the opposite view, if available.
 - b. Attach the report to the bill so that it can be referenced if needed
 7. **Calendar Committee**

- a. Once a bill comes out of committee, it is sent to the Calendar Committee to be placed on the docket for the next full legislative session (BSF-7)
- 8. Second reading of the bill (may include debate and additional amendments)**
- a. Where most of the debate on the bill occurs
 - b. Each representative is limited to a total of 2 minutes of debate per bill in the House. (Example: For Bill 000, Representative A debates for 30 seconds, and Representative B for 50 seconds. Representative A has 1 minute 30 seconds remaining on Bill 000 and Representative B has 1 minute and 10 seconds.)
 - c. Each senator is limited to a total of 3 minutes of debate per bill in the Senate.
 - d. The Parliamentarians shall be responsible for tracking debate time and limits, and the boys are encouraged to bind themselves to an honor code of keeping time themselves.
 - e. A motion to end debate requires a 2/3 vote. This vote shall be done only by roll call vote, in which each member's name is called and their vote counted. The Clerk is charged with creating and maintaining a list of individuals in their house with assistance from the Parliamentarian.
 - f. The bill may be passed or voted down by a majority vote
 - g. Amendments - Must be voted on
- 9. Third and final reading of the bill**
- a. A third reading is necessary only when a bill was passed with amendments
 - b. The bill comes up on the schedule for Third Reading
 - i. A roll call vote is taken on final passage of the bill
 - ii. Every bill that has been voted on by committee must be voted on by the Senate or House at least once
- 10. Goes to the other chamber (House or Senate) for the same process (steps 1-7)**
- a. The first chamber that passed a bill sends it in legal form with all amendments to the Second House with a message stating the bill passed
 - b. The second body introduces the bill and follows the normal legislative procedures
 - c. If the bill passes the second chamber without being amended
 - i. The bill is sent to the Governor for his actions
 - ii. A message so stating. If there are amendments added, the First Chamber must concur with those amendments.
 - d. If the bill passes the second chamber with amendments
 - i. The first chamber must concur with those amendments
 - 1. If the first chamber concurs with amendments
 - a. The bill is sent to the Governor for his actions
 - b. A message is sent to the second chamber stating the bill has moved forward to the Governor's office.
 - 2. If the first chamber does not concur, the bill moves to Conference Committee.
- 11. Conference Committees resolve the differences between the House and Senate versions of bills**
- a. A conference committee is made up of two delegations (one from the Senate and one from the House) with three members each, selected by the president and Speaker. The conference committee meets in attempt to work out a common language acceptable to both the Senate and House when agreement could not be reached through individual committees or floor amendments.
 - b. Any agreement reached by the conference committee is tentative. They must be submitted to both chambers for full floor consideration. The agreement reached is presented as a full-bill amendments. That is, the conference committee takes all modifications and present it

as one amendment. No further amendments can be made by the individual chambers (there is only a yes-or-no vote. If either chamber rejects the agreement, the bill fails.

- c. Committee members are appointed by the Speaker of the House and President of the Senate.

12. **Governors Actions**

- a. Signs the Bill – Becomes Law
 - i. Become effective immediately
 - ii. An established time is provided for in the bill
- b. Refuses to sign the Bill - Become a law if not signed within 10 hours after it's passed the second chamber.
- c. Veto – Sent back to the house where the bill originated
 - i. In its current form, it must pass both houses with a 2/3 vote to become Law

13. **Gubernatorial Appointments**

- a. The Governor appoints a Chief of Staff and the Supreme Court, and within the Supreme Court, the Chief Justice is elected. The nominees for Chief Justice and Chief of Staff must appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee for consideration.
- b. The Senate Judiciary Committee shall hold hearings and other testimony regarding the nominees' qualifications. The committee shall render an opinion based on majority vote to the consideration of the full Senate.
- c. In order to confirm a nominee, the Senate must approve by a 2/3 vote
