Welcome to American Legion Colorado Boys State

The thought of creating a fully functioning 51st state (including cities, counties, political parties, a state legislature, and executive branch of government) is overwhelming. But you and your fellow American Legion Colorado Boys State **Citizens** will do just that.

This **Daily Guide** has been designed to assist you in this endeavor. If you read and follow the instructions in this guidebook you will begin with small steps and gradually learn the processes required to create and operate your government. **Please be aware: locations may change, so be vigilant!**

Our time is limited, so don't delay in getting started. Review each day's schedule, and the additional information noted at the end of the day. There are many helpful hints and guidelines to assist you. Though time passes quickly, don't short-cut anything. It will not benefit you or Boys State to merely "check off" the required steps. Work through each step thoroughly and strategically, as they affect how future requirements are met. **Keep up, but don't get ahead of yourself.**

It is extremely helpful to review the next day's schedule at the end of each day. Ask questions if you must, but the best source of guidance is this book, the **Boys State Manual**, and your fellow Boys State Citizens. After all, this is your Boys State, and the quality of government you create and manage will be entirely based on your desires and your ability to negotiate and compromise with other Citizens.

Towards the end of the week, you will serve in the House of Representatives, the Senate, the Supreme Court, or a City, County or State Government position. There you will create bills or debate bills to form Boys State Law. The bills must be created by you and your fellow Citizens, so don't miss any opportunity to record your thoughts and ideas on the BSF-2 form for bills for resolutions. Don't be afraid to share your thoughts on real issues of today. There is a strong possibility that some bills debated and passed at Colorado American Legion Boys State will be shared with real Colorado State legislators, perhaps even the governor himself.

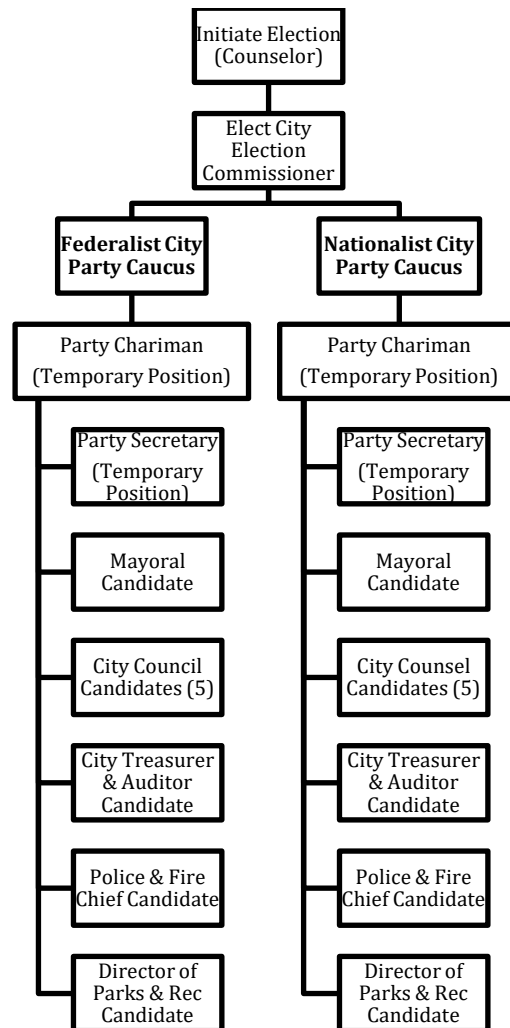

CITY CAUCUS



RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES

1. A citizen may only appear on the City and County General Election ballot **once** and may only hold one full time position in City OR County Government, but not both. Election Commission, City Party Chairman and Secretary, County Party Chairman and Secretary are positions that are elected during the City or County Party *Caucuses*. These positions *will not* appear on the ballot and are not full-time positions. If elected to the City or County Party Chairman or Secretary, you remain eligible to be nominated for a City or County position.

2. Election Commissioners may **only** serve as the Election Commissioner until City/County and State/Legislative branches are open for business. He cannot be nominated for any City or County Position. The Election Commissioner will be appointed to State position after the general election, or will serve in the House of Representatives. If an Election Commissioner would like to be nominated for a state-level office or US Senator, he must resign his Election

Commissioner role. A replacement shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. Additional opportunities exist at the state level under the Secretary of State.

3. All citizens will be elected or appointed to a City or County Government office.
4. All citizens must be registered to vote in any election. (Completed BSF-10)

PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A CITY CAUCUS

1. The City will meet in their Designated City Meeting Area for a quick overview of the nomination process, how to become a candidate, offices to be nominated, and the election of the **City Election Commissioner** (done by the City Counselor).

NOTE: The Election Commissioner may participate in all nominating activities but cannot be nominated or appear on the City General Election ballot.

2. After the election of the Election Commissioner, the City will split along party lines and convene for their respective **City Party Caucus** in their assigned areas. A Counselor or Advisor will serve as the temporary City Party Chairman and assist in the organization of the caucus, and he will serve in this capacity until a **City Party Chairman** is elected.
3. After outlining the caucus rules, procedures, and positions to be nominated and elected, the Counselor will open nominations for City Party Chairman. Once a City Party Chairman is elected, he will take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the City Party Caucus and lead the nomination and election process for the City Party Secretary. After the Party Secretary is elected, the City Party Chairman will open nominations for the rest of the elected City positions in the following order:

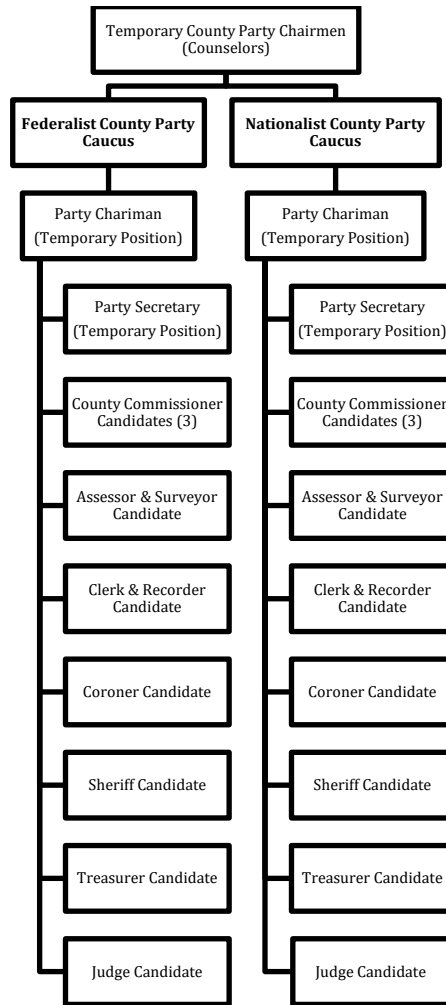
Mayor (1), City Council (5), City Treasurer & Auditor (1), Police & Fire Chief (1), and Director of Parks & Recreation (1).

NOTE: City Party Chairman and City Party Secretary are *temporary* positions. Citizens elected to these positions *are eligible* to be nominated for any office within Colorado Boys State, including City positions.

At the conclusion of the City Party Caucus, the City Party Secretary is responsible for the completion of BSF-1A (City Party Caucus Nominees), and this is to be turned into the Election Commissioner no later than 8:15 PM, Sunday.

All City Party Caucus should be completed within an hour and thirty minutes. BSF-1A must be completed by the City Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner. All Election Commissioners must report to the Election Commission Headquarters no later than 8:30 PM Sunday with their completed BSF-1A.

COUNTY CAUCUS



RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES

1. A citizen may only appear on the City and County General Election ballot once and may only hold one full time position. City Party Chairman and Secretary, County Party Chairman and Secretary are **not** full-time positions. The Election Commission cannot be nominated for a position at this time.
2. All citizens will be elected or appointed to a City OR County Government office.
3. All citizens must be registered to vote in any election (**BSF-10** – filled out at City Party Caucus)

PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A COUNTY CAUCUS

1. The County Parties will meet in their predesignated County Party Caucus meeting locations for a quick overview of the nomination process, how to become a candidate, offices to be nominated,

and committee elections. **The Election Commissioner will not participate in any County nominating activities and cannot be nominated or appear on the ballot as he will be in the initial Election Commission Meeting.**

2. A Counselor or Advisor will serve as the temporary County Party Chairman and assist in the organization of the caucus. He will serve in this capacity until a County Party Chairman is elected.
3. After outlining the caucus rules, procedures, and positions to be nominated and elected, the Counselor will open nominations for County Party Chairman. Once a County Party Chairman is elected, he will take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the County Party Caucus and lead the nomination and election process for the County Party Secretary. Once the Party Secretary is elected, the County Party Chairman will open nominations for the rest of the elected County positions in the following order: County Commissioners (3-at large), Assessor & Surveyor (1), Clerk & Recorder (1), Coroner (1), Sheriff (1), and Treasurer (1).

NOTE: If a citizen received their party's nomination for a position in their City Party Caucus, they are not eligible for nomination at the County level.

4. Once all County positions are nominated, he will begin the nomination process for **State Senators**. The number of State Senators to be nominated will be determined by staff based upon Boys State total population. The duties of State Senator begin after the general election, so a citizen can hold a City or County position and also be nominated for State Senator at the County Caucus.
5. If a citizen intends to be a candidate for one of the following: Governor, Lt Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, or State Treasurer he may NOT also be a candidate for State Senator.

NOTE: After the General Election on Wednesday morning, all Boys State citizens will serve in the House of Representatives if not elected or appointed to another state level position.

NOTE: County Party Chairman and County Party Secretary are temporary positions. Citizens elected to these positions are eligible to be nominated for any office within Colorado Boys State, including County offices.

6. At the conclusion of the County Party Caucus, the County Party Secretary is responsible for the completion of BSF-1B (County Party Caucus Nominees), and this is to be turned into the Election Commission Chairman no later than 9:45 PM, Sunday.

All County Party Caucus should be completed within an hour and thirty minutes. BSF-1B must be completed by the County Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner.

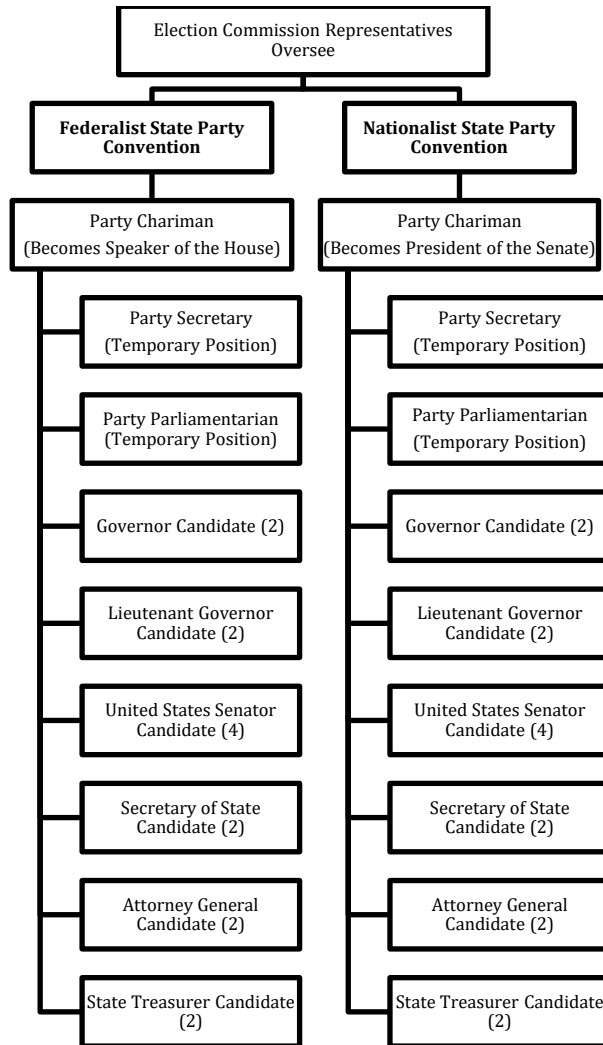

STATE PARTY CONVENTION



PROCEDURES TO CONDUCT A STATE CONVENTION

1. The State Party Convention elects a State Party Chairman, Secretary, and Parliamentarian. The state party officials preside over the convention as it nominates candidates for state offices.
 2. The State Party Convention is called to order by the Election Commission Representative, who will remain the presiding officer until a State Party Chairman is elected. To kick off the convention, the presiding officer will introduce the rules and procedures to the entire party caucus and allow for any additional amendments to the rules from the floor.
 3. After confirming the convention rules, procedures, and amendments, nominations for State Party Chairman will be opened. Once a State Party Chairman is elected, he will take over as the presiding officer for the remainder of the State Party Convention, leading with the nomination and election process for the State Party Secretary and State Party Parliamentarian.
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NOTE: to become an eligible candidate for State Party Chairman or State Party Parliamentarian, you must pass the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. A list of eligible citizens will be provided to the Election Commission Representative leading the State Party Convention from the Election Commission.

4. Once the party leadership is in place, the State Party Chairman will open nominations for the State elected positions in the following order: Governor (2), Lieutenant Governor (2), United States Senator (4), Secretary of State (2), Attorney General (2), and State Treasurer (2). Once all State positions are nominated, the remaining time should be used for campaigning and strategizing for the State Party Primary Election. The candidate who receives a majority of the votes in the State Party Primary (except for US Senator-top two vote getters) will move on to the General Election.

NOTE: to become an eligible candidate for Attorney General, you must pass the Bar Exam. A list of eligible citizens will be provided by the Election Commission to the State Party Secretary.

Once the State Party Convention is completed, the BSF-1C must be finalized by the State Party Secretary and turned into the Election Commissioner.

RULES PERTAINING TO NOMINEES FOR STATE OFFICIALS AND PARTY LEADERSHIP

1. A citizen may only appear once on the State Primary and General Election ballot. All citizens elected or appointed to a City or County Government Office are eligible for all State-wide elections.
2. State Party Leadership (Chairman, Secretary, and Parliamentarian): Once elected to a State Party Leadership position, he can resign but cannot be nominated for a State Level Office.
 - a. Election of a new State Party Chairman: Led by the Election Commission Representative with the support of a Counselor. Anyone can be nominated, and they must have passed the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. The election of the State Party Chairman should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
 - b. Election of a new State Party Secretary: Led by the State Party Chairman. Anyone can be nominated (unless they already hold a State Party leadership position). The election of the State Party Secretary should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
 - c. Election of a new State Party Parliamentarian: Led by the State Party Chairman. Anyone can be nominated (unless they already hold a State Party leadership position) and they must have passed the Parliamentary Procedure Exam. The election of the State Party Parliamentarian should follow The Rules Governing State Party Conventions.
3. Once a citizen receives a nomination and is chosen to appear on the State Party Primary Ballot, he may not resign or run for another office.

4. Election Commissioners Representative Role:
 - a. Serve as the presiding officer until the State Party Chairman is elected.
 - b. If the Chairman were to resign, the election commissioner would serve in this capacity until a new chair is elected.

5. Special Assistant to the State Party Secretary:
 - a. Provide a list of those citizens who have passed the Bar and Parliamentary Procedure Exams.
 - b. Support all needs of the State Party Secretary.

6. Requirements for Nomination:
 - a. State Party Chairman – Pass Parliamentary Procedure Exam
 - b. State Party Secretary – None
 - c. State Party Parliamentarian – Pass Parliamentary Exam
 - d. Attorney General – Pass Bar Exam

RULES GOVERNING STATE PARTY CONVENTIONS

1. Delegates will be seated according to City in the same section as their County.

2. Cities will be polled alphabetically in nomination and voting.

3. During the roll call for nominations, the City when called, nominates its candidate(s).
 - a. Individuals cannot self-nominate, and every nomination must be seconded by some other than the nominator and nominee.
 - b. There are not to be any nomination speeches at this time.

4. Once all Cities have been polled, a final call for nominations will be taken. Once all nominations have been made, nominations will be closed.

RULES FOR STATE PARTY/STATE LEVEL OFFICE ELECTION PROCESS

1. If **more than** 8 nominees:
 - a. Candidates speak for up to 30 seconds each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **8**. The 8 winning candidates move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.

 - b. The 8 Candidates then speak for up to 45 seconds each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **4**. The 4 winning candidates 4 move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
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- c. 4 candidates then speak for up to 1 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **2** candidates and top 2 candidates move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - d. The last 2 candidates then speak for up to 1 minute. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for **1** candidate, the winner assumes the State Party Office. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip performed by the election commission representative and monitored by a counselor.
2. If **only** 5 to 8 nominees:
- a. Candidates speak for up to 45 seconds in the order of nomination. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **4**. The 4 winning candidates 4 move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - a. 4 candidates then speak for up to 1 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **2** candidates and top 2 candidates move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - b. The last 2 candidates then speak for up to 1 minute. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for **1** candidate, the winner assumes the State Party Office. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip performed by the election commission representative and monitored by a counselor.
3. If **only** 3 or 4 nominees:
- a. candidates then speak for up to 1 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **2** candidates and top 2 candidates move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
 - b. The last 2 candidates then speak for up to 1 minute. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for **1** candidate, the winner assumes the State Party Office. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip performed by the election commission representative and monitored by a counselor.
4. If **only** 2 nominees: The 2 candidates speak for up to 1 minute. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for 1

candidate, the winner assumes the State Party Office. If there is a tie, it will be broken by a coin flip performed by the election commission representative and monitored by a counselor.

5. If **only** 1 nominee, they simply assume the Office.

RULES FOR U.S. SENATOR ELECTION PROCESS

1. If **more than** 8 nominees:
 - a. Candidates speak for up to 1 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **8**. The 8 winning candidates move forward. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off will be done for only those candidates.
 - b. The 8 candidates then speak for up to 2 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **4** candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
2. If **only** 5 to 8 nominees:
 - a. The candidates speak for up to 2 minute each. At the conclusion of the speeches, each candidate states their name and Boys State City before the vote. Vote for up to **4** candidates and top 2 candidates move forward to the State Party Primary Election. If there is a tie for the final position(s), a run-off off will be done for only those candidates.
3. If **only** 3 or 4 nominees, then all candidates simply move forward to State Party Primary Election.
4. If **only** 2 nominees then candidates appear unopposed on State Party Primary Election ballot.

GENERAL RULES FOR ELECTIONS

1. The Parliamentarian serves as a timer. He shall set a timer for each speech.
2. All voting is to be done by electronic voting if available with help from the Election Commission. If electronic voting is not available, then the raising of hands (head down, hands up) is the preferred method.
3. Results of all voting should not be shared with the candidates.
4. Where the caucus rules do not take care of a situation, Robert's Rules of Order prevail.

NOTE: Selection of party candidates for the State Party Leadership and Primary Ballot are subject to the established rules. These rules are voted upon by the entire party and are subject to change by the party prior to selecting primary election candidates.

ideals to each city. At the same time, each city is entitled the right to ask the candidates questions pertaining to their candidacy, proposed programs, and personal character.

This is intended to be an exercise in the local nature of state politics. A state candidate must earn his office by competing for local communities' loyalties. It is through that loyalty that a candidate becomes successful and maintains his influence while in office.

It is also a fun time, as questions can range from, "What is your goal with the highway funding issue?" to "Have you ever licked the tail of a frog, and why not?" This is a moment of hilarity and camaraderie. We are providing guidelines to what is and what is not acceptable.

ACCEPTABLE

- Funny questions
- Policy questions
- Questions about a candidate's allegiances

UNACCEPTABLE

- Touching of candidate
- "Strobe-lighting"
- Forcing candidate to consume any product or material
- Extreme profanity
 - Includes comments considered discriminatory
 - Any comment on the physical characteristic of the candidate is out of bounds
- Cannot compel the candidate to lay prone/horizontal

It is highly recommended and encouraged that more than half of your questions are policy oriented.

PROCEDURES FOLLOWED IN PASSING BILLS IN THE STATE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

A NOTE ON BILLS AND THE BUDGET: After a bill passes its first committee in its first Chamber (House, for example), it then goes to the Finance Committee for funding. It is the Finance Committee alone which determines whether the bill makes the “cut line”.
 If the Finance Committee fails to pass the bill, it dies (or is “postponed indefinitely”). If it passes, it returns for a full floor vote in the first Chamber (House, for example). The Bill Sponsor should take the lead in floor debate.
 If it passes that vote, it begins the process anew in the 2d Chamber (Senate, for example). There it must again receive a passing vote in two Senate committees, including the Finance Committee. If it fails to pass either committee there, it dies (or is “postponed indefinitely”).

1. Calendar Committee Review

- a. The Committee Chairman brings the bills to his committee meeting for discussion
- b. All bills are reviewed by the committee and grouped by content to help determine which bills will move forward
 1. All bills are to be considered and grouped by content and organized into a main bill to be present to the respective legislator.
- c. Establishes the Order of Business (BSF-7) for the first reading
- d. Bills are forwarded from the Calendar Committee:
 1. Senate Secretary
 2. House Secretary
- e. Committees of Record. Each Chamber of the Boys State Legislature will have the following committees:
 1. Agriculture, Energy, and Natural Resources (AENR)
 2. Business, Labor, and Commerce (BLC)
 3. Finance and Appropriations (FA)
 4. Health, Human Services, and Education (HHSE)
 5. Transportation, Housing, and Local Government (THLG)
 6. State, Judicial, Veterans, and Military affairs (SJVM)

2. Introduction

- a. All bills and resolutions must be introduced by a member of the legislature. Senators introduce their bills in the Senate and Representatives introduce their bills in the House.
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- b. The bill itself must bear the name of a member or the names of a group of members of the legislature.
- c. Introduction of a bill is limited to 45 seconds and no questions are permitted at this time.
- d. All bills must be turned into the Senate or House Calendar Committee for ordering, approval, and forwarding to the Senate or House Secretary for first reading.
- e. All revenue bills must originate in the House.

3. First reading by the Secretary

- a. All bills are numbered consecutively
- b. Introduced by the Secretary of the chamber by its number and title (example: Senate Bill 24-06 – The Affordable Mental Health Aid Act)
- c. To be read by the Secretary (with the help of the author if possible or necessary)
- d. Bill is read, there is no debate at this time

4. Bills and Members assigned to committees by Speaker of the House/President of the Senate

- a. Each Calendar Committee will recommended committee assignments for each bill
- b. The Speaker/President shall assign each bill to a specific committee for consideration.
- c. Each member of the House and Senate will serve on one committee and may not serve on more than one committee.
- d. The Speaker of the House and President of the Senate will appoint members of their respective chambers to each committee
 - i. House – no more than 11 members and a minimum of 7 on a committee and no more than 3 members can be from the same city on the same committee
 - ii. Senate – no more than 7 members and a minimum of 4 on a committee and no more than 2 members can be from the same city on the same committee
 - iii. Leadership may ask for volunteers, but they hold the ultimate decision on committee assignments
 - iv. Once each committee is formed, each committee will elect a committee Chairman and Vice Chairman from its membership by majority vote.
 - v. The Chairman of each committee will appoint a delegate to serve as Committee Clerk, whose duty it is to read each bill as it is heard and ensure the votes of the committee on each bill are correctly recorded.

5. Committee Hearing (where public testimony & amendments may be offered) in consideration of the bill

- a. Earliest stage of bill review and the workhorse of the legislator
- b. Review assigned bills
 - i. Receive testimony from public, including the governor’s staff and bill sponsors, on the bill
 - ii. Develop recommended amendments and mark-up bill as needed
- b. After public testimony, debate on each bill in committee shall be limited to 8 minutes.
- c. Vote on the bill for either a favorable report to the full chamber, an unfavorable report, or postpone indefinitely, effectively killing the bill. All bills with a vote (favorable or unfavorable) shall be given to the Calendar Committee to be placed on the docket.

6. Committee reports offered

- a. Provide a brief report of the bill, favorable or unfavorable, and provide a minority report for the opposite view, if available.

- b. Attach the report to the bill so that it can be referenced if needed.
7. **Calendar Committee.** Once a bill comes out of committee, it is sent to the Calendar Committee to be placed on the docket for the next full legislative session (BSF-7)
7. **Second reading of the bill (may include debate and additional amendments)**
- a. Where most of the debate on the bill occurs
 - b. Committee chairmen shall present the marked-up bills, providing a brief summary of committee reports.
 - c. Each representative is limited to a **total** of 2 minutes of debate per bill in the House. (Example: For Bill 000, Representative A debates for 30 seconds, and Representative B for 50 seconds. Representative A has 1 minute 30 seconds remaining on Bill 000 and Representative B has 1 minute and 10 seconds.)
 - d. Each senator is limited to a **total** of 3 minutes of debate per bill in the Senate.
 - e. The Parliamentarians shall be responsible for tracking debate time and limits, and the boys are encouraged to bind themselves to an honor code of keeping time themselves.
 - f. A motion to end debate requires a 2/3 vote. This vote shall be done only by roll call vote, in which each member's name is called and their vote counted. ***This rule cannot be suspended.*** The Secretary is charged with creating and maintaining a list of individuals in their chamber with assistance from the Parliamentarian.
 - g. The bill may be passed or voted down by a majority vote. ***There are no filibusters at Boys State.***
 - h. Amendments - Must be voted on, approved by majority vote.
9. **Third and final reading of the bill**
- a. A third reading is necessary only when a bill was passed with amendments
 - b. The bill comes up on the schedule for Third Reading
 - i. A roll call vote is taken on final passage of the bill
 - ii. Every bill that has been voted on by committee must be voted on by the Senate or House at least once.
10. **Goes to the other chamber (House or Senate) for the same process (steps 3-9)**
- a. The first chamber that passed a bill sends it in legal form with all amendments to the Second House with a message stating the bill passed
 - b. The second chamber introduces the bill and follows the normal legislative procedures
 - c. If the bill passes the second chamber without being amended, the bill is sent to the Governor for his action.
 - d. If the bill passes the second chamber with amendments, the bill moves to a six (6) person Conference Committee.
11. **Conference Committees resolve the differences between the House and Senate versions of bills**
- a. A conference committee is made up of a delegation from the Senate and a delegation from the House with three (3) members each, selected by the President and Speaker. The conference committee meets in an attempt to work out a common language acceptable to both the Senate and House when agreement could not be reached through individual committees or floor amendments.
 - b. Any agreement reached by the Conference Committee is tentative. The compromise bill must be submitted to both chambers for full floor consideration. The agreement reached is
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presented as a full-bill amendment. That is, the conference committee takes all modifications and presents it as one amendment. No further amendments can be made by the individual chambers (there is only a yes-or-no vote). If either chamber rejects the agreement, the bill fails.

- c. Conference Committee members are appointed by the Speaker of the House and President of the Senate.

12. Governor Actions

- a. Signs the Bill – Becomes Law
 - i. Become effective immediately
 - ii. An established time is provided for in the bill
- b. Refuses to sign the Bill (pocket veto) - The bill will not become law if the Governor does not sign the bill within one (1) hour after it is passed the second chamber, and the legislature is not in session. It will become law if the Governor does not sign the bill within one (1) hour after it is passed the second chamber, and the legislature is in session.
- c. Veto – Sent back to the chamber where the bill originated
 - i. In its current form, it must pass both chamber with a 2/3 vote in each chamber to become Law.

13. Gubernatorial Appointee Confirmation

- a. The Gubernatorial appointees for Chief of Staff and entire Colorado Boys State Supreme Court must appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee for consideration.
- b. The Senate Judiciary Committee shall hold hearings and other testimony regarding the nominees' qualifications. The committee shall render an opinion based on majority vote to the consideration of the full Senate.
- c. In order to confirm a nominee, the Senate must approve by a 2/3 vote.
- d. Once confirmed, the Colorado Boys State Supreme Court will elect their Chief Judge from among themselves.
- e. All other Governor Appointees will assume their roles without confirmation hearings.

14. Other Actions. Any actions not directly addressed in this section can be found in the Colorado State Legislator Rules.

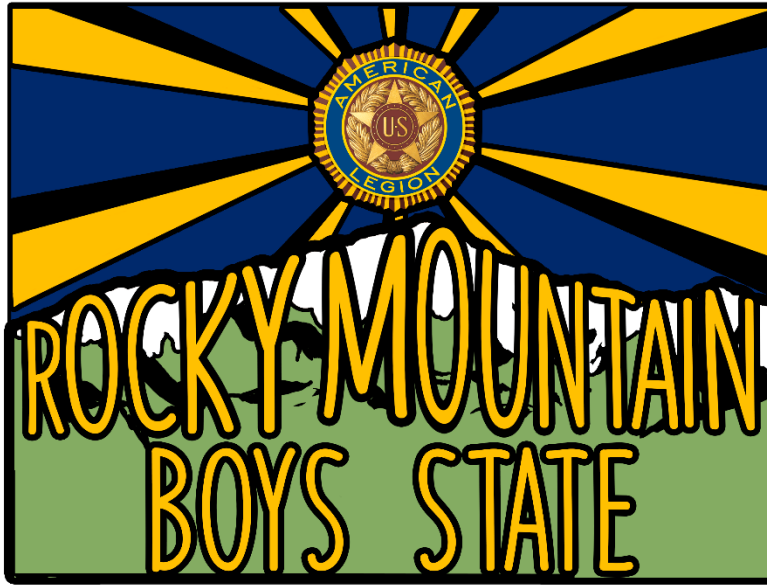
